FROM THE PRESIDENT

I have high hopes for 2021 but I have to admit that, so far, my feelings of frustration and helplessness over COVID-19 have only increased. And while chocolate and red wine are occasionally good spirit boosters, I decided that some calorie-free solutions might be in order. "This is an unusual time for all of us, but it's a time when we can channel our worry and uncertainty into real actions that can help our friends, our neighbors, our community and ourselves," said Alfreda Rooks, director of Community Health Services for Michigan Medicine. Those words inspired me to do a bit of brainstorming. Here I present nine ways to shake off the COVID-19 blues.

- 1. *Get ready*. While you're stuck at home, clear your space. Go through your closets and bag clothes you are no longer wearing; gather household items you no longer need; clean your kitchen cupboards and box up unused pantry items.
- 2. *Make a donation*. Food banks, homeless shelters, and animal rescue groups can put your unwanted items (and spare cash) to good use. Do your homework and make sure you are working with reputable organizations! Then drive through and drop off or arrange for home pick-up.
- 3. *Check on other people.* Call family and neighbors you haven't heard from in a while; set up a Zoom coffee hour or happy hour with friends; send a handwritten note to a loved one who lives far away.
- 4. *Make a special delivery.* Perhaps an elderly acquaintance could use some groceries or a home cooked meal.
- 5. *Use your skills.* Sew masks; knit or crochet baby hats, chemo hats, and soap sacks for the homeless (soapsacks.com). All these items can be contributed through the mail.
- 6. Be a virtual volunteer. There is an immediate need for crisis counselors, online mentors, and readers for the blind all done through the miracle of technology. A quick Google search will reveal numerous opportunities.
- 7. Buy local. Small businesses have suffered greatly over the past several months. Help them survive this pandemic by ordering delivery from a locally owned restaurant, buying a gift card for future use from your favorite hair or nail salon, or purchasing handmade items from local artisans all accomplished from the safety and comfort of your living room.
- 8. Give blood. Enough said.
- 9. Spread good news and kindness. Be careful what you post on social media, my friends. Why contribute to the negativity and toxicity that is already prevalent at every turn? I challenge you to find ways to be a force of positivity and encouragement instead.

GCMTA MUSIC EDUCATION PEDAGOGY MAJOR SCHOLARSHIP

This exciting scholarship opportunity of \$500 is available to eligible applicants who are high school seniors and who plan to pursue a Bachelor of Music Education or Pedagogy.

APPLICANT QUALIFICATIONS:

- 1. Applicant must be a senior in high school who has been accepted as a music major in education or pedagogy and is entering that particular program in the upcoming year. The higher education institution must have the ability to graduate students with a Bachelor's degree in music education or pedagogy. Verification of acceptance to the accredited music education school must be submitted with the application.
- 2. Applicant must be the student and/or child of a GCMTA teacher in good standing for the current year.
- **3.** Applicant must have participated in at least one GCMTA adjudicated performance event in the previous twelve months (i.e. Auditions, Music Day, Federated Festival), and must submit a copy of the adjudicator's comment sheet to the MED/PED Scholarship Committee.
- **4.** Applicant must submit the URL of an online video with applicant performing any repertoire on his/her chosen instrument not to exceed 10 minutes. Memorization is not required.
- 5. Applicant must complete and submit the MED/PED Scholarship application to the Chair by the deadline of May 1.
- 6. Applicant must submit a 350 word or less essay describing why music education or pedagogy is an important career path to pursue.
- 7. Applicant must provide the name and email address of his/her music teacher willing to write a recommendation for the applicant. He/she will be contacted to submit a recommendation for the applicant.
